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HISTORICAL SPOTLIGHT:

LIGHT RAIL THROUGH MILLBRAE — THE OLD BECOMES THE NEW

Towards the end of the 19th century, the **San Francisco and San Mateo Railroad Company** began building a streetcar line down the San Francisco Peninsula. In 1902 a state-of-the-art power station was built just north of Millbrae Ave. The fireproof red brick building was 45 feet x 75 feet, with all modern amenities including a track level lobby for passengers. The electrical substation transformed the incoming 13,200-volt AC power down to 550 volts to run the streetcars.

What was known as the **#40 Line** had several stops in the Millbrae area. The #40 Line was the primary form of public transportation on the Peninsula during its half-century of operation. If you had to get to high school in Burlingame or San Mateo it was easy - just hop on one of the special cars reserved for students only.

In 1907 a two-line service replaced the single-tracks into San Mateo. In anticipation of extending service to San Jose, 12 new larger street-cars were purchased. At this time, most fares were 5 or 10 cents, but in 1915 there was the creation of the Peninsula Rapid Transit Bus

PRESIDENT'S REPORT JOHN MUNIZ

As a follow up to my June 2015 President's message, I want to bring our members up-to-date on the progress of the **Millbrae Historical Society Carriage House**. At the July Board of Trustees meeting, the Board unanimously approved funding to construct a Carriage House on the vacant lot at the back of the Museum (see site in the picture on the right). The

Carriage House will be architecturally in keeping with the Museum building, with the same color, shingled, and a similar hip roof design. The Carriage House will be 750 square feet, 25-ft wide by 30-ft long. The 9-ft x 10-ft garage doors will allow our 1931 Southern Pacific Fire Engine and Larkins Surrey to be housed inside, along with other exhibits reflecting the history of Millbrae. It has been 30 years since



the Millbrae Museum was moved from Broadway and Ludeman Lane. At that time, the Society intended to build a Carriage House on the property adjacent to the Museum. I have appointed a "Blue (continued on Page 2)

Ribbon" Committee to work with the City of Millbrae and our building contractor to finalize the plans for the Carriage House. The Committee consists of myself, **Vern Bruce, Tom Dawdy, and Cathy Quigg.** We estimate ground breaking to be in the spring of 2016. VICE-PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

PAUL LARSON

Greetings MHS Trustees, members, family and friends.

It is so nice to see all of our Millbrae Historical Society members around town. I seem to bump into so many of you when I least expect it, and it's a nice surprise for me to say Hi to everyone.

September and October are great months here on the Peninsula because the weather is usually warmer than during earlier summer months. This makes our area unique. Now all we need is rain! The El Niño weather pattern out in the Pacific is supposed to correct all our dry weather later this year... we will have to wait and see what happens.

Speaking of September, here are several noteworthy historical happenings connected with the month:

September 1, 1939 - At 5:30 am, **Hitler**'s armies invaded Poland, starting World War II in Europe.

September 2, 1945 - President Harry Truman declared V-J Day (Victory over Japan Day) commemorating the formal Japanese surrender to the Allies aboard the USS Missouri in Tokyo Bay.

September 5, 1975 - The first of two September assassination attempts on **President Gerald Ford** occurred as a woman pointed a gun at the President in Sacramento.

Two weeks later, a second attempt occurred as another woman fired a shot at Ford in San Francisco. Ford was not harmed in either incident.

September 11, 2001 - The worst terrorist attack in U.S. history occurred as four large passenger jets were hijacked then crashed, killing nearly 3,000 persons. Two fullyfueled jumbo jets, American Airlines Flight 11 carrying 92 people and United Airlines Flight 175 carrying 65 people, had departed Boston for Los Angeles. Both jets were diverted by the hijackers to New York City where they were piloted into the twin towers of the World Trade Center. The impact and subsequent fire caused both 110-story towers to collapse, killing 2,752 persons including hundreds of rescue workers and people employed in the towers. In addition, United Airlines Flight 93, which had departed Newark for San Francisco, and American Airlines Flight 77, which had departed Dulles Airport for Los Angeles, were hijacked. Flight 77 with 64 people on board was diverted to Washington, D.C., then piloted into the **Pentagon** building, killing all on board and 125 personnel inside the building. Flight 93 with 44 people on board was also diverted toward Washington but crashed into a field in Pennsylvania after passengers attempted to overpower the terrorists on board.



September 12, 1953 - John F. Kennedy, 36, married Jacqueline Bouvier, 24, in a ceremony before 750 invited guests at St. Mary's Church in Newport, Rhode Island, conducted by Archbishop Richard Cushing of Boston.

September 14, 1982 - Princess Grace of Monaco died following an accident in which her car plunged off a mountain road in Monte Carlo. Her daughter Stephanie, also in the car, survived and was treated for shock and bruises. Princess Grace (Grace Kelly) was a Hollywood actress who met Prince Rainier III of Monaco during filming of the Hitchcock film To Catch a Thief. She then gave up a successful acting career and married him in 1956.

September 16, 1620 - The May-flower departed from England, bound for America with 102 passengers and a small crew. The ship weathered dangerous Atlantic storms and disembarked at Plymouth on December 26th.

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

Line, which created new competition for the street-cars. Furthermore, the Market Street Railway was now operating the #40 Line and raising fares. The Southern Pacific Railroad had commuter fares of 40 cents round-trip to San Francisco. In 1944, the city of San Francisco purchased the Market Street Railway, including the #40 Line. On January 16, 1949 the line ceased operations.

I don't remember the streetcars, since I was only oneyear-old when the last car rolled through Millbrae. I do remember the Power Sta-

tion, however. The building was torn down in October 1956.

Fast forward to 2015, and **Caltrain** is getting ready to go electric! If plans go well, next year the \$1.5 billion project will begin and overhead poles & electrified wires will be installed through Millbrae and along the 51-mile Caltrain corridor. Old ideas will become new again!


We want to thank Trustee and Docent **Ray Gier** for all his hard work in restoring and refinishing five of
