HISTORICAL SPOTLIGHT: MILLSDALE INDUSTRIAL PARK Том DAWDY ΒΥ

On January 14, 1948, Millbrae officials traveled to Sacramento and obtained the Certificate from the Secretary of State to incorporate Millbrae as a new independent city. The next evening, the first Millbrae City Council was sworn into office. This was the end of several years of court battles with Burlingame, and the boundaries of the new City were set, but not quite all set. The arguments between the two cities continued for another seven years on how to divide up the Mills Estate and the commercial property planned for the Millsdale Industrial Park east of the railroad tracks. Both sides accused the other of building a "Great Wall of China" around the Mills Estate. Finally after a 4-1/2 hour meeting between the two city councils in 1955, both sides came to an agreement on the new municipal boundary line.

The Mills Estate was equally divided in the upper half of the property, while in the lower portion Millbrae was given jurisdiction extending to a line 750 feet south of Millbrae Avenue, just beyond the boundary of the future Mills High School site. That boundary line was extended straight down to the Bay. This division of land gave the City of Millbrae just a small portion of the new Millsdale Tract already under construction between the Southern Pacific railroad tracks and the Bayshore Highway.

MILLSDALE INDUSTRIAL PARK (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

Millsdale Industrial Park was developed by hauling 2 million cubic yards of soil from the higher ground west of El Camino Real that was designated for residential development. The cow fields and baylands east of the railroad tracks were filled in to a level of up to 6 feet. The newly zoned commercial land was valued at \$5,000 per acre before development. Private developers invested approximately \$15,000 per acre into new industrial buildings and infrastructure. By the time the first facilities were being built in 1956, the land in Millsdale was appraised at \$35,000 per acre. Some of the first firms to move into Millsdale were Guittard Chocolate, Johnson's Wax. and DeLaval Steam Turbine Co.





Millsdale was developed in the "new way" of developing industrial parks. The old practice was to zone the land and leave the development style up to the discretion of the individual tenants. Millsdale development featured strict architectural controls, 70% land coverage limits, minimum setbacks, off-street parking requirements, and mandatory offstreet loading facilities. Millsdale was restricted to light industrial usage. Smoke, noise and odors were out, (except for the sweet smell of chocolate)!
