I have exciting news to report regarding the new **Millbrae Museum Carriage House !** The exterior of the building has been painted, the electrical system has been roughed-in, the wall and ceiling insulation has been installed, and the rain gutters will be mounted soon. Next comes the sheetrock, taping, texturing and painting, followed by interior and exterior lighting. Then the carriage-style garage door will be installed, and permeable interlocking concrete pavers will be placed in the driveway. And finally, a weather vane will be erected on the roof! I estimate completion of the building by mid-August. We can then plan a grand opening and dedication ceremony. Not bad for a project fully funded by the **Millbrae Historical Society**!

exhibits we will be showcasing in the Carriage House. We will be displaying photos and artifacts that will knock your socks off! Some, never before seen, one-of-a-kind relics of the past will be on display!



GOOD OLE DOWNTOWN MILLBRAE (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

Every block on Broadway had a Mom & Pop store to fill your every need. On the 300 block was the **5 & 10 Cent Store** (where **Lai Lai** & the **Cleaners** are today). There were other variety stores in Millbrae like **Cassidy Variety** (where **Nummis** is), but the 5 & 10 Cent Store had all your household needs and was a downtown staple. Across the street (where **Broadway Bistro** is) was the **Hillcrest Pharmacy**. This store was more than a pharmacy — it had a great record department, and an excellent camera department. I have a good friend that is several years older than me that worked in the camera department. He always tells

me that he remembers me constantly coming in with my nose against the glass cases looking at the cameras! There were other locally-owned pharmacies in Millbrae as well, and of course all of them delivered anything you needed - especially after your local doctor made a personal house call to your home. There were also plenty of clothing stores with oldfashioned service on the three blocks of our quaint downtown. Men's store? Ritz Shop, one of the best on the Peninsula.



Women's clothing? The **La Mia Shop**. Shoes? **Belvini's Shoes.** No one ever had to go out of town for back-to-school shopping.

All these stores were great, but there was nothing that could compare to my favorite – the **Brick 'O Gold** (**Round Table Pizza** is there today). I really believe that if "The Brick" were here today, it could be a National Treasure! The Brick 'O Gold, run by Howard Cobb, was open from the late 1940's until 1965, when Howard closed the doors to this Millbrae landmark. I really doubt that there are <u>any</u> Baby Boomers that grew up in Millbrae or even nearby that would not feel the same as I do about "The Brick".

So what happened here? Downtown Millbrae, like a lot of other quaint downtowns across the country, went through many changes for the same reasons. Regional shopping centers were a big part of the puzzle that caused the Mom & Pops to close. In Millbrae, **Millbrae Square** opened in the 1960's with a big **Walgreens** store. The smaller pharmacies on Broadway eventually closed their doors. **Britt's Department Store** (now **Living Spaces**) had all the stuff to fill your needs. At the same time, **Hillsdale Shopping Center** opened, soon followed by **Tanforan Mall**. This was a new era in our economy. In 1958, **Safeway**, which was located where **Pape's Meats** is today, moved to their new location. A few years earlier, **Broadway Market** opened (where **Office Depot** is today). We now had two major supermarkets in town!

In 1990, I moved my business back downtown (where **Dean's Produce** is today). Our studio had been on El Camino for quite a few years, and I wanted to get back downtown to my old stomping ground. Downtown was more bustling, but still had some of its old quaintness. In 1996,

Mark Simon from the **San** *Francisco Chronicle* asked to interview me about downtown Millbrae. We walked up and down the three blocks full of stores, talked about the old times and new times. On August 9, 1996 the *Chronicle* ran a full-page story titled "Millbrae Looks to the Future But Cherishes its Past". The quote of the week in the paper was mine — "I love Millbrae and I don't want to have my business anywhere else."

My wife **Faye** and I were always active downtown. In 2000, we were recognized as the "**Millbrae Business of the Year**". A couple of times we organized a small **Millbrae Christmas Parade** for

the **Millbrae Chamber of Commerce**, with Santa Claus on a fire engine throwing out candy canes to the children. We worked several years on the **Art and Wine Festival Committee**, going several days with little sleep. In the 1990's we helped organize downtown cleanups with the Chamber and the **Rotary Club**. We swept the sidewalks and scraped all the gum off with putty knives. I had my own power washer and was proud of my clean storefront. We loved downtown Millbrae and were each honored as "**Man and Woman of the Year**". We were very sad in 2004 when we left downtown and moved our business to Burlingame.

Over these last few years, a new chapter in shopping has opened. Online shopping is now causing all the big retailers to suffer. It is ironic that a lot of these same businesses were the ones that caused the Mom & Pop stores to close their doors decades earlier. Who knows, maybe someday there may be a resurgence of small businesses with personal service, and the Mom & Pop stores might return to our little town. It's very common to have recurring dreams – in my dreams I'm often back in the 1950's in "Good Ole Downtown Millbrae".

TRAIN NEWS MUSEUM FURBER, ELIZABETH EDITOR BRUCE, VERN REPORTER


