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## HISTORICAL SPOTLIGHT:

## MILLBRAE COMMUNITY PLAYERS

Back in 1939, the people in the quaint unincorporated town of Millbrae wanted to enhance the community's cultural offerings, so the call went out for players to participate in live stage productions. Fifty actors, actresses, directors, musicians and scenery painters showed up at the first meeting. Everything was falling into place for Millbrae's first live theater production! The town had a nice local auditorium with a decent stage at **Chadbourne School**, and **William Gibson** became the first President of the group. The first director was **Fred Carlyle** from the **San Mateo Adult School**. In June of

1939, the **Millbrae Community Players'** first production - **Nothing but the Truth** - debuted. The Players called Chadbourne School their home for the next 19 years, occasionally moving to other venues. The cost of admission was thirty-cents, and they played to full houses most of the time. In 1940, **Ralph Schram** of the **College of San Mateo** became the group's second director, a position he held for the next ten years. Ticket prices rose in the 1940's - first to 60 cents then to 80 cents (67 \( \psi + 13 \( \psi \) tax).

During WWII, the Players presented benefit performances for the Red Cross and Civil Defense Agencies. Also during the war, quality productions were sometimes difficult to maintain because the actors were apt to be drafted for military service during the rehearsals period. The Millbrae Community Players also offered workshops and classes for community members. During the holidays, the Players presented **Miracle of the** (continued on Page 4)

# PRESIDENT'S REPORT JOHN MUNIZ

On March 13, 1970, the Millbrae Historical Society incorporated as a non-profit organization and received its Articles of Incorporation from the State of California. That makes the Millbrae Historical Society fifty years old! For fifty years, the Society has been serving the community by preserving and enhancing the great history of Millbrae. How did the Millbrae Historical Society come about and

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why? Because of a failed attempt to rescue the **16 Mile House** from destruction and move it to **Constitution Square**. The **16 Mile House** was built in **1872** by **Juan Sanchez** as an inn to provide income for his mother, **Francesca Sanchez**. The **16 Mile House served as a grocery store, inn, restaurant, saloon, speakeasy, and a bordello at one time. Wealthy San Franciscans stopped and watered their horses while en-**



joying some cool refreshment in the bar. The 16 Mile House was sixteen miles from the San Francisco City Hall - thus came the name 16 Mile House. As the 20th century marched on, the old 16 Mile House was

unable to keep up with the times as a profitable enterprise and was scheduled for demolition early in 1970. In response, a community group called "The Citizens to Save the 16 Mile House" was formed. Lead by John Brucato

(1905-2003), the group incorporated as the "Millbrae Historical Society". Via a City of Millbrae "straw ballot", an advisory vote was taken to gauge

the level of public support for moving the 16 Mile House to city-owned property on Poplar Avenue (the current location of the Millbrae Museum). The Millbrae Historical Society was unable to raise enough funds to move and re-



store the 16 Mile House to be used as a museum, so it was demolished in January 1971. The 16 Mile House served as the catalyst for the founding of the Millbrae Historical Society and gave the City of Millbrae and its residents an awareness of its unique history.

In 1985, the Millbrae Historical Society fulfilled its dream of creating a history museum by arranging for the relocation of the 1898 Spring Valley Water Company (predecessor of the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission) Manager's house located on Broadway and Ludeman Lane (now site of Cadence of Millbrae). The house was moved to its current location in Millbrae's Civic Center and renovated to serve as the Millbrae Museum.

Thanks to dedicated Millbrae residents such as **John Brucato**, the first Historical Society President, who was instrumental in procuring the Spring Valley house, **Helen and George Habeeb**, Historical Society Trustees, and the hard work and self-sacrifice of count-



less individuals, we are blessed to have today's lasting appreciation for Millbrae's history.

Today we have three beautiful museums, all within the city limits of Millbrae and within walking distance of each other - the **Millbrae Museum**, open Saturdays from 12:00 noon to 4:00 pm, and the **Millbrae Carriage House** and the **Millbrae Train Museum**,

open Saturdays from 10:00 am to 2:00 pm. The Museum and Train Museum have free internet access. By the way, the Train Museum is an excellent location for birthday and anniversary parties for children and adults. It has gone through extensive renovation thanks to Director Vern Bruce and his crew of docents, the Millbrae Historical Society, and Caltrain. There are many new interesting and educational exhibits. The Millbrae Train Museum has scheduled a Grand Re-opening celebration on Saturday. June 6th. This will be a fun event, so mark your calendars and stay tuned for updates. All three Millbrae Museums can be opened during the week by special request for private and school tours. The Carriage House is not always available for tours on Saturdays because of the lack of docents. The Carriage House can be opened by special request on weekdays and Saturdays.

So, what is the next fifty years going to look like for the Millbrae Historical Society? What will become of our legacy, hard work and dedication of the past fifty years? It is up to the residents of Millbrae and the nature of our society in the coming years. Currently we have about 140

Millbrae Historical Society members, and our age demographic is well over 55 years of age. In order to continue as a viable entity in Millbrae we need to attract younger members as volunteers. We also need more cultural diversity within



our membership. Finally, we could use more members to volunteer as docents so we can open the Carriage House more often.

Have you been to the Millbrae Museum lately? The exterior has gone through some changes. The farm equipment and picnic table have been relocated to the west side of the museum, which allows for better usage of the picnic area. Last year the City of Millbrae replaced the roof, added new copper gutters and downspouts, and painted the exterior of the building.

Don't forget our annual **Fourth of July Picnic** on **Saturday, July 4th**. The flyer will be out in May, so keep an eye out.





**Nativity**, often free of charge, and the request for tickets always had a long waiting list.

December 1, 1946 was a real exciting day for the Players (they called it a "red letter day"). At 3:30 pm on that Sunday afternoon, the familiar voices of the Millbrae stage were broadcast on their first radio show (KVSM 1950 on the dial). The radio play was *A Cake for Dr. Johnny*. Afterwards, some of the Players admitted in their newsletter that although they had previously been critical of radio dramas, they were really happy with the outcome and professionalism of the broadcast.

Throughout the years, the Millbrae Community Players were always a big part of our town. In 1958, when the **City of Millbrae** celebrated the 10-year anniversary of its incorporation and the Fire Department moved into their new station on Magnolia Avenue, the old firehouse at 255 Broadway was put up for sale. The Players made an offer of \$10,000 for the abandoned building, and the City accepted it. **Millbrae Mayor Douglas Morgan** was quoted as saying "This is the City's contribution to the betterment of the community".

The Players spent an additional \$1,000 renovating their new theater. They were the only player group in the area to own their own stage. In 1958, the Players opened their 20th season in Millbrae. During these years, the Players presented many drama and musical performances, and good reviews came in from all over the area. A scrapbook preserved at the Millbrae Museum includes a clipping from the **San Francisco Chronicle Datebook** featuring a review of a Community Players performance highlighted by an image of the "little man" jumping out of his seat clapping. During this era, Millbrae was filled to the brim with local merchants - almost all "Mom & Pop businesses". The Players always had widespread community support and sponsorships from Millbrae merchants.

In 1970, after 31 years of entertaining the Millbrae community, the Players closed their theater and sold the building. For a period of several years, the Millbrae Players continued to support students from Mills & Capuchino High Schools with scholarships funded with money from the sale of the theater. Even with the loss of the Millbrae Players, 1970 was a special year in our City, as this is when the Millbrae Historical Society was officially chartered. This year we celebrate our 50th anniversary!

They have been placed at each end of our beautiful grand piano. Also we received a waffle iron and sifter from Erik Erickson, along with kitchen utensils belonging to his grandmother. Denise Crocker recently donated a copy of the Millbrae Sun dated Nov. 3, 1982. along with a very interesting chart for keeping your flowers fresh from the former Peters & Wilson Nursery that was located on East Millbrae Avenue & Rollins Road. The prefix to their telephone number is listed as Oxford 7, not 697. Maynard (1st graduating class of Capuchino High School), daughter of Ruth Maynard (very active in Millbrae's past), donated a box full of memorabilia, including old newspapers and Capuchino yearbooks,



and a pill box from the former Hillcrest Pharmacy, located in the 300 block of Broadway, which we have placed in the showcase in the Dining Room.
