MILLBRAE HISTORICAL TIMELINE" DAWDY




**Darold Fredricks** was a great local historian. Even though he lived in San Bruno, he also had a passion for Millbrae history. Darold taught Chemistry and Biology at Westmoor High School for thirty years, after which he retired and turned to his true love — writing history. He wrote a book on San Bruno history and in 1991 published Millbrae: A Place in the Sun. I had the pleasure of knowing Darold and even helping him a little with his Millbrae history book. Darold often gave lectures on local history, and up until his death in 2015 he wrote a

history column for the San Mateo Daily Journal.

Not long ago, I was digging through some historical documents at the Millbrae Museum and found one of Darold's journals full of his very well organized notes referencing a lot

of Millbrae history. Inside I found a "timeline of Millbrae" that Darold had put together. I believe that Darold donated this journal to the Millbrae Historical Society shortly before his death. I now have the privilege of sharing this timeline with our Society members. The list of dates includes recorded history from 1769 through 1999. The following entries are the highlights that cover Millbrae and the surrounding area.


sional fundraising firm to manage fundraising. So that is the good news!

## DAROLD E. FREDRICKS' "MILLBRAE HISTORICAL TIMELINE" (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

**1769...** Gaspar de Portola discovers the Bay from Sweeney Ridge

1776... Anza expedition pioneers El Camino Real

**1770's –1820's**... Rancho Buri Buri used to graze cattle and horses of Mission and Presidio

**1822...** Mexico takes over Spanish Empire in New World **1835...** Rancho Buri Buri granted to Jose Antonio Sanchez

**1830's...** Sanchez Adobe Hacienda built (Dylan Hotel and Nothing Bundt Cakes are there today)

**1840's...** Breakup of the Rancho Buri Buri after the death of Antonio Sanchez

**1850's...** Perry Jones moves to Millbrae, buys 300 acres (Millbrae Villa), and builds Millbrae Hotel (El Camino Real & Millbrae Avenue)

**1840's-1850's...** Morgan Oyster Company operates in Millbrae growing oysters in the Bay (their hut was east of the 17 Mile House until 1940)

**1850's...** D.O Mills buys property for his future Mills Estate from James Wilson. Wilson had recently purchased the "Jose de la Cruz property" at a Sheriff's auction for \$1,000. Wilson sold the property to Mills for \$10,000.

**1859...** D.O. Mills and brother-in-law Ansel Ashton acquire over 6,000 acres of the former Rancho Buri Buri property

**1860's...** Jose de la Cruz was still living in Millbrae (where Ludeman Lane is today)

1861... The 17 Mile house was sold

**1862...** Alfred F. Green moves to Millbrae and becomes a partner with D.O. Mills in the Millbrae Dairy. Green builds his house at 1 Lewis Avenue (still standing today)

**1863...** San Francisco & San Jose Railroad is up and running, making the stagecoach obsolete

**1867...** H. Garnot General Merchandise opens at Millbrae Avenue & El Camino Real

**1872...** Juan Sanchez builds the 16 Mile House for his Mother Francisca Sanchez (wife of Manuel)

**1872...** Silva buys land near current I-380 in San Bruno and buys land in the middle of Millbrae known as the "Silva Tract" from Cornelius K. Garrison

**1872...** Mills drains marshlands east of the railroad tracks (using Chinese labor)

1870... Mills builds his famous "Mills Mansion"

**1880...** Johann Fredrick Ludemann buys 72 acres from Maria C.S. Sanchez for \$5,000 (future site of the Union Golf Club, later Green Hills Country Club)

**1882...** Millbrae Hotel is now open to the public as a branch of the "San Bruno House" with Dick Cunningham serving as the proprietor

**1889...** Famous boxer James Corbett leases and runs the Millbrae Hotel. He was a World Heavyweight Champion and the only boxer to defeat John L. Sullivan. After that, the famous boxing phase "The man who beat the man" was coined. Corbett was also known as the "Father of modern boxing".

**1890's...** Spring Valley Water Company buys Silva Tract **1895...** William F. Dunphy residence burns at Linden & Serra Avenues

**1896...** Chadbourne Avenue School built (Poplar & Chadbourne Avenues)

**1902...** Antonio Massolo rents land for farming

**1903...** #40 Interurban Line opens from San Francisco to San Mateo (1903-1949)

1905... 16 families live in Millbrae

1906... The Great 1906 Earthquake

1907... Millbrae Hotel destroyed by fire

**1910...** Alfred F. Green dies January 6; D.O. Mills dies January 13

1914... St Dunstan Church built on the corner of Hermosa Avenue & El Camino Real

**1919...** West Coast Porcelain Works opens (1919-1930's)

**1920's...** Dr. Leider builds Capuchino Golf Course

**1922...** New Chadbourne School built, on corner of Magnolia & Chadbourne Avenues

**1920's...** Mills estate rents their land for Mills Airfield

**1924...** Phillips Family opens up Burlingame Lumber Co. on El Camino (where Safeway stands today)

**1927...** Gus Moeller & Neil Schultz purchase the Ed Taylor property and begin developing Millbrae Highlands

1928... Spring Valley Water Co. sold to City/County of San Francisco, becomes San Francisco

Water Dept.

1930's... Royal Container moves into West Coast Porcelain site on Millbrae Avenue

**1931...** Millbrae Volunteer Fire Dept. — Les Pallas, Art Snider, H. Terrill (Art Snider was 1st Captain '32-38)

1934... Millbrae Fire District formed

1936... Millbrae Community Methodist Church opens

**1936...** 401 Broadway becomes first commercial building built on Broadway

**1937...** Fire House built at 225 Broadway; American La France fire truck donated by the Mills Estate

**1937...** Millbrae Community Center opens on SF Water Dept. property; WPA project built with adobe bricks

1938... Millbrae Lions Club chartered on February 25

1938... Taylor School built


**1938...** Les Pallas becomes Millbrae's first paid firefighter at \$80/month

1943... Neil Schulz builds Bayside Manor during war

1946... Max Schmidt builds Meadow Glen

**1947...** The famous Gypsy's burns down (Santa Barbara & Lomita Avenues)

**1948**... Incorporation of Millbrae on January 15; W.F. Leutenegger 1st Mayor; Walter Swope appointed Police Chief; Green Hills School opens



1949... Neighborhoods change in Millbrae; Barcelona Ave. changed to Palm Ave.; Santa Barbara and Santa Anita Aves. built in Capuchino Tract; Millbrae Theater opens (demolished in 1994); #40 Street Car line ceases operation on Peninsula

**1950...** Capuchino High school opens; James Kilpatrick becomes third Mayor of Millbrae; St. Dunstan Church and Rectory is built on Broadway

**1952...** Larry Pickett is appointed Police Chief; Highlands Elementary School opens

1953... St. Dunstan School is built

1954... Glen Oaks School opens

**1955...** Stoneson Development Co. completes the first houses in the Millbrae Meadows; landfill begins for Millsdale Industrial Park

1958... Millbrae celebrates the City's 10th Anniversary; New City Hall & Police Station dedicated; Mills High School opens Late 1950's.... San Francisco Water Dept. declares Silva Tract surplus land (auctioned off 1960)

**1962**... \$1,368,000 permit issued to Barton Development Co. to build Richmond Square Shopping Center

**1965...** American Housing Guild buys Silva Ranch for \$3,000,000 to build **197** units & apartments

**1966...** Fire Chief Les Pallas retires; Robert Kohler becomes new Chief: Rotary Club of Millbrae is chartered

**1967...** Royal Container (now Georgia Pacific) moves to South San Francisco; Millbrae Elementary School built on Springfield Drive

1968... Millbrae declares Azalea "Official City Flower"

**1970...** New Recreation Center built on Richmond Drive; Millbrae Historical Society is chartered

1983... St Dunstan Parish Hall built

**1985...** Millbrae Historical Society negotiates the acquisition of the six-room Victorian home of the SF Water Dept. Supervisor and moves it to Constitution Square where extensive renovation takes place to become the Millbrae Museum

**1990's-2000...** Millbrae Avenue Overpass built and BART Station under construction

This is the end of Darold's timeline, and I am also running out of space for this article. This was also the end of the century. Millbrae survived "Y2K" with none of the major havoc that was predicted, and our City of Millbrae made it safely into the 21st Century!
