## HISTORICAL SPOTLIGHT: MARTINELLI'S STEAK PIT BY FAYE DAWDY



Frank Martinelli II was a restaurateur from a family of pioneers in the San Francisco nightclub industry. The native San Franciscan started at the famous Bal Tabarin nightclub in the North Beach neighborhood. His father Frank Martinelli opened the Bal Tabarin with bandleader Tom Gerun and restaurateur **Bob Grison** in 1931. An architect named Timothy Pflueger was contracted to give the Bay Tabarin the sophistication that helped make it a very popular go-to cocktail spot in San

Francisco, featuring many famous bands and multi-act floor shows including showgirls. Word has it that in 1936 Ann Miller danced there. In 1950, the Bal Tabarin was sold to Austin Giuntoli for \$100,000 and renamed Bimbo's 365 Club. Frank Martinelli's first venture was the hot dog stand at Playland at the Beach. He was often written about by columnist Herb Caen.

The Coral Reef was a Polynesian restaurant in Millbrae owned by Buddy and Roberta Maleville. Bing Crosby and Bob Hope frequented the restaurant in the 1950's. Frank Martinelli II bought the Coral Reef and renamed it Martinelli's Steak Pit. He also owned the *Chalet* in Redwood City, the *Beach House* and *Hillsdale Inn* in San Mateo, the Adobe Creek Lodge in Los Altos, and the Vinegar Barrel Smokehouse in Calistoga.

Hello friends and neighbors! By now you are pondering the big question - now that COVID-19 restrictions are being relaxed and vaccines are being distributed at a rapid pace, when will our three beautiful museums be opened? On June 8th, the Millbrae City Council will be discussing the feasibility of opening City buildings effective August 2nd. The Millbrae Museum and Carriage House are

City-owned buildings; therefore, we will comply with the decision of the City Council. If the City moves forward with the opening of City-owned facilities. I will schedule the opening of the Millbrae Museum, Carriage House, and Train Museum on August 14th. I will keep you posted.

When the three museums are finally opened, I think you will be impressed by some technology improvements that have been made by



our newest member, Train Museum docent, and Chief Technologist, Peter Sheerin. We now have full Wi-Fi access at all three museums, with the same Wi-Fi name and password. In this Newsletter, you will find the

Wi-Fi instructions for all three museums. Once you are inside one of the museums, you scan the "QR" code with your phone or tablet, type in the password, and you are on the museum Wi-Fi. Once you are on the Millbrae Museum Wi-Fi, it is good for all three museums. Now that we have a more robust Wi-Fi network, we will be requesting approval from the Board to fund the purchase of two outdoor security cameras for the Millbrae Museum - one for the front porch and one for the rear porch.

We have also added some color to the Museum's front porch by adding some potted sunflowers and hydrangeas (see photo below).



If you have ever been to the Millbrae Museum, you surely have seen the 1900 American Electric telephone. Well, our vintage phone will not work over modern electronic phone lines - it is just for show. But, not anymore! Peter Sheerin has added the capability of using our American

Electric Telephone via an internet connection. We have connected the **Western Electric** wall phone at the Train Museum to an internet-based telephone service that replicates the sounds and operation of older telephone networks. The best feature is a volunteer human operator, so that when a visitor picks up the earpiece, they can call any normal telephone number and have a free phone conversation on a 1908 phone!

Do not forget the **Grand Re-Opening of the Train Museum** and **51st Anniversary of the Millbrae Historical Society** on Saturday, October 23, at the Millbrae Train Museum from 10:00 am to 4:00 pm.

Thank you to all who serve the Millbrae Historical Society and their efforts to keep the history of Millbrae alive for future generations.




## EXCERPT FROM MARTINELLI'S STEAK PIT (CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

Frank Martinelli II was also an aspiring actor and had parts in some gangster and war movies. In 1942, he joined the US Navy. He was later appointed to a Senate Committee that surveyed the aftermath of the war in Asia, the Middle East and Europe. After that, he became an account executive at a New York advertising agency, but ended up returning to the restaurant business working in both San Diego and Florida before coming to

Millbrae. He and his wife had four children.

Martinelli's Steak Pit was later sold to the **Bocci** family of Colma. Tom Bocci ran the restaurant for many years and it was a go-to establishment for many Millbrae and Bay Area residents. It was eventually sold and converted to **Zen Peninsula** restaurant that is still open today.

## TRAIN MUSEUM NEWS

Throughout the closure, Millbrae Train Museum volunteers have been working to build new exhibits, and in particular create interactive exhibits. The first of these links the Millbrae Museum and the Millbrae Train Museum together. We've connected the 1908 Western Electric 293A phone at the Train Museum and the 1900 American Electric phone at the Millbrae Museum to a vintage Internet telephone service, called the Novelty Public Switched Telephone Network (NPSTN). The



NPSTN is a volunteer project that replicates the sounds and operation of the old North American telephone system. So even though neither phone has a dial, you'll be able to pick up the receiver and be connected directly to a human operator, who will then connect you to any 7-digit number on the NPSTN—a few of which are at other museums. We have also reserved the entire OXford 7 exchange, so that we can use historical Millbrae phone numbers in the exhibit!
