HISTORICAL SPOTLIGHT

MILLBRAE FIRE DEPARTMENT

Everyone that has some knowledge of Millbrae history knows that Millbrae was incorporated in 1948, but the "Village of Millbrae" formed a Millbrae Fire Department several years before Millbrae became a city. Around the turn of the century, when structures in Millbrae caught fire it was likely that they would just burn to the ground. One example was the infamous *Millbrae Hotel*, opened to the public in December 1882

and sold to World Heavyweight Boxing Champion

James Corbett in 1889. It was destroyed by fire without a single firefighter in site. In 1895, William Dunphy's residence burned to the ground on Linden Avenue. After the fire, the Dunphy Mansion was built on the site. The Millbrae Train Depot burned down twice before the third one, which houses the Millbrae Train Museum today, was built. After researching articles archived at the Museum, I learned about the old Spanish homes in Millbrae that did not burn because they were made of adobe with little wood. In the later "village years," new

Millbrae, during the 1920s and 1930s when the densely-forested estate bult by **D.O.** Mills in the 1870s was still intact, was hardly more than a collection of saloons, gambling establishments, and the **Sixteen Mile House** - a well known bordello. Flower and truck gardens flourished in the sun, a different picture from what we see today. Today, Millbrae is a bustling community, known for excel-

lent schools, population diversity, a transportation hub, and best-in-class recreation facilities.

Speaking of recreation, I hope that you had the opportunity to attend the new Millbrae Recreation Center ribbon cutting and grand opening on June 11th. Millbrae can be proud to show off our new, state-of-the-art facility. Did you notice the historical images of Millbrae displayed in the main hall? They were

I will bet you were not aware of the other golf facilities in Millbrae besides the **Green Hills Country Club**. There were two — the **Peninsula Golf Practice Range**, which was a driving range on Millbrae Avenue where the skate park is today, and the **Capuchino Golf Club**, a 96-acre golf course in northern Millbrae. Not much is known about the Peninsula Golf Practice Range, which closed about 1957. The Capuchino Golf Club was owned by the Capuchino Golf Corporation. The golf course land was subdivided in 1927 and parcels were sold in the late 1930 and early 1940's to create the Capuchino residential neighborhood. The only proof that the Millbrae Historical Society has that the two golf venues existed are the matchbook covers pictured at right.

buildings like the **16 Mile House** were framed with wood. It was said that if they caught fire, you got out as fast as you could and just watched them burn.

Fast forward to 1931 when the Millbrae community organized the Millbrae Volunteer Fire Department. In the beginning, you could join the department and become a volunteer firefighter by paying the dues of 25 cents per month. 39 community members soon signed up to be volunteer firefighters. This helped finance operations and training. The bylaws from the San Bruno FD were used as a guide to form the group and the fire districts. The firefighters were paid one cold beer after fighting one hot fire! So things were off and running for the "MVFD"! The first three members were **Les Pallas**. Art Snider, and Harold Terrill. Art Snider was elected the first Fire Captain in Millbrae (1932-1938). In August 1931, a siren was installed at a local business that sounded the alarm to summon the volunteers for a fire. In 1934, the Millbrae Fire District was formed. Niels Schultz, developer of the Millbrae Highlands, donated the first piece of equipment to the MVFD. It was a twowheel hand cart carrying 400 feet of hose. Later a 1931 Chevrolet truck was donated by the Redwood City Fire Department and converted into a "hose wagon" with the same 400 feet of hose. This became Millbrae's first fire truck. This truck was nicknamed Junior. Schultz also provided the beer after fires.

Another big event happened in 1937, when a new fire house was built at 225 Broadway. The lot was purchased for \$600, and community volunteers with the help of WPA workers constructed Millbrae's new fire house for \$2,500. The Ogden Mills Family donated \$3,000 so the Fire Department could buy their first real fire engine for \$6,500. The sparkling new engine was a



500-gallon-perminute American LaFrance
Pumper. This beautiful fire engine is currently housed at the Millbrae Museum Carriage House!

In March 1942, a second piece of equipment, a 750 GPM **Challenger Triple Pumper**, was added. The purchase price for the Challenger was \$9,450. This new fire engine replaced *Junior* - the original Millbrae fire truck. Most of the fire department were still volunteers - **Mel**

and Sil Massolo along with Billie Wallace and Jerry Schumaker headed up the volunteer staff.

Millbrae's population was growing fast after World War II, and the 25x55-foot fire house building on Broadway was getting obsolete. After two failed bond elections, Millbrae



voters passed a \$70,000 bond in 1955 to purchase an acre of land on Magnolia Avenue from the San Francisco Water Department to build a new fire station. The City

came up with \$130,885 to build the new station by dissolving the City's two fire districts and selling the old fire station building on Broadway. Millbrae's new fire station was opened in time to celebrate the City's ten year anniversary in 1958, along with the acquisition of a fifth vehicle, a combination tanker-pumper fire truck.

In the early 1970's, there was a tragic fire in the upper **Millbrae Meadows** neighborhood. Millbrae residents were concerned about the response time by the Fire Department, and approved a second Millbrae fire house in March 1974, which opened in December 1975.

In 1966, Chief Pallas retired after 35 years of service. He was replaced by **Robert Kohler**. In 1979, **Mike Golder** became Millbrae's third Fire Chief, followed by **William Moke**. **Brian Kelly** became chief in 1987.

Millbrae's final Fire Chief was **Dennis Haag**. Dennis was born and raised in Millbrae and served his hometown fire department for 33 years before his retirement in 2012. Dennis was a very unique chief, serving as both police and fire chief for some time under the title of "Director of Public Safety". Dennis not only wore two hats in Millbrae, but he also served as Millbrae-San Bruno Fire Chief and led the response to the Sept. 9, 2010 fatal San Bruno gas pipeline explosion.

Today Millbrae is part of the **Central County Fire Department** that includes Burlingame and Hillsborough. The Department's coverage area is approximately 15 square miles, with a population of 70,000. There are seven fire stations, including the headquarters on Rollins Road in Burlingame. Millbrae has come a long way from *Junior*, their first fire truck, to a high-tech modern fire department staffed with highly-trained firefighters and paramedics.

TRAIN MUSEUM NEWS

Hello everyone! I have good news (overall) regarding the proposed High Speed Rail plan's effect on our Train Museum. The final Environmental Impact Report (EIR) for the San Francisco to San Jose portion of the proposed High Speed Rail project was released in June. To summarize: The relocation of our Millbrae Depot to accommodate High Speed Rail track expansion will still place the depot in close proximity to the relocated operating Caltrain tracks. Also, they had already provided space for our parking needs and the Civic Center railcar. However, the report indicates that it is not likely that there will be enough space for our 1 and 1/10th-mile operating rail

line, although they did not rule it out entirely.

If you would like to view the relevant parts of the EIR, you may go to the website:

then push the blue button entitled "San Francisco to San Jose Final EIR/EIS". Then hit the link "Final Environmental Impact Report/Environmental Impact Statement" and scroll down to "Volume 4" and click "Chapter 23" and scroll down to Page 135. If you want to see the final proposed station-area plans and renderings, go back and find Volume 3, Book A3, sheets #45 to 50. I am satisfied that the High Speed Rail Authority has adequately addressed our concerns.
