Candlestick Park. the Mission and Geneva Drive-In movie theaters. The US population was 190,895,000, and Millbrae had a population of 15,873. Millbrae had two bowling alleys - the Millbrae Bowl and Kings Bowl. You could catch My Fair Lady at the Millbrae Theater, and then go for dinner and drinks at Martinelli's Steak Pit. You could catch the Southern Pacific commuter train at the Millbrae Station on Millbrae Avenue to San Francisco or San Jose. Parking was available in front of SFO Airport right under the Peace Statue created by Benny Bufano, now located on Brotherhood Way in SF. You could buy a suit at Schneider's or pick up a pair of shoes at Belvini's. Fill up your tank at Dawdv's Shell Station on Broadway. Cruise the El Camino and stop by Shaw's for ice cream. Stock up on shrubs, flowers and trees at Peters and Wilson's Nursery or order lumber to build a room addition at

Millbrae Lumber. Read the *Millbrae Sun* in the Mermaid Room at the El Rancho Inn on El Camino.

There you go, now sixty years later, the Millbrae you love and remember is "gone with the wind". No matter how much Millbrae has changed, in the words of **Dorothy Gale** in 1939's *The Wizard of Oz*, "There's no place like home!"

### VICE-PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE PAUL LARSON

Greetings MHS Trustees, members and friends!

Our community has a good number of organizations with great historical significance, and I am honored to be active in a few listed here:

- Since I grew up with this organization, I'll begin with Chapel of the Highlands Mortuary, now in its seventh decade of serving the community. We are the oldest business in Millbrae, owned by the Larson Family since October 5, 1952.
- 2. The Millbrae Lions Club was chartered in 1938, roughly a decade before Millbrae became a city, and has been actively supporting the community with fundraisers and projects designed to help those in need, moving the community in a positive direction, and having fun while doing so. Many "movers and shakers" that made Millbrae the place it is today have been prominent members of the Millbrae Lions Club.
- The Millbrae Historical Society was founded in 1970 as a result of the controversial demolition of the original and historic 16 Mile House, built as a road house in 1872 on what is now the corner of El Camino Real and Center Street. The Millbrae Historical Society has a dynamic membership and is focused on protecting and acknowledging Millbrae's history and historical locations via three community museums: the Millbrae Museum. the Carriage House and the Millbrae Train Museum.
- 4. The Italian Catholic Federation Branch 403 at Saint Dunstan's Church, established on February 25, 1990, has its roots going back to 1924. Recently celebrating 100 years, the ICF began in San Francisco as an organization celebrating and remembering the community's Italian heritage (most members have an Italian background but everyone is wel-



come, and you don't have to be Italian to belong).

The entities listed above are just the tip of the iceberg. Most communities have volunteer organizations like Millbrae's: groups focused on educational, civic, youth, senior, or spiritual needs that you too can be a part of. Each are noted for helping enrich the lives of those living here and contribute to the vibrant fabric of Millbrae.



**Antonio Sánchez**. Rancho Buri Buri encompassed much of what is now San Mateo County, including the future site of Millbrae.

### 2. Early American Settlement:

After the Mexican-American War and the subsequent cession of California to the United States in 1848, the land began to be divided and sold. The estate of **Darius Ogden Mills**, a prominent financier and philanthropist, played a key role in the development of Millbrae.
